

Questions

1. For the student competition, how should we consider economic feasibility when assessing possible solutions? To what degree should we consider things like university budget, construction costs, etc.?

Response: The Sandbox competition recommends proposed improvements are not constrained by a set cost or budget; however, recommendations should be feasible and suitable to the size/scale of the community and university.

2. How many members can be on one team for a professional competition?

Response: There is no limit to number of contributors; however, only 2 representatives of the professional team can be presenters at the annual meeting.

3. For the student competition can a university have multiple submissions?

Response: The Sandbox Competition will allow a university to have no more than two (2) submissions; and no team members can be duplicated on the submitting teams.

4. Can there be only one person on the professional team?

Response: Yes.

5. For professional competition, would the design be just for that specific area of census tract and transferability within the larger highlighted grey area? Or would it be for the entire grey area that was highlighted?

Response: Professional teams should identify the specific tract impacts and both evaluate & propose how it applies to all areas outlined.

6. Will a full guideline document be provided other than what's on the website and in this meeting?
